10	Access to health care, affordable treatments, innovations and related issues (pre-existing
	conditions, access to medications, physician care services, preserving Medicaid & CHIP for
	underserved populations).
6	Access to screening, diagnostic technologies (with ample physician education). Under-
	diagnosed Asthma and COPD and reimbursable screening (CT Scans).
4	Access to effective rehabilitation services, treatments and equipment.
3	Improved funding for lung disease programming and research. Enhanced messaging to
	remove the stigma associated with lung disease.
3	Access to care via telehealth, access to proper and necessary care (both RTs and
	specialists), and advocacy for public policies that restrict the practice or ease the burden of
	barriers like prior authorization, step therapy, and non-medical switching.
2	Better education, support and advocacy for patients and families.
2	Care coordination, efficiency, and effectiveness, age-appropriate care.
2	Tobacco cessation/control efforts must continue/expand, including raising the age for
	purchase of tobacco, and decreasing smoking among women of child-bearing potential.
2	Clean, unpolluted air.
